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Civilians seek UN assistance in Jonglei

On 14 July, The United Nations Mission in South Sudan (UNMISS) was alerted by Sudan People's Liberation Army (SPLA) of the arrival in Manyabol of a large number of Lou Nuer youth in need of urgent medical assistance. The mission dispatched a military team.

While a six-person UNMISS medical team treated the wounded, the rest of the platoon helped secure and prepare the helicopter landing strip for arriving flights used to airlift casualties to hospital.
