### UNMISS “Protection of Civilians” (PoC) Sites

As 6 June 2019, a total of number of civilians seeking safety in six Protection of Civilians (PoC) sites located on UNMISS bases is **181,096** including 100,441 in Bentiu, 29,190 in Malakal, 30,272 in Juba UN House, 2,061 in Bor, and 19,132 in the area adjacent to UNMISS in Wau “.

**Source** The figures reported are based on Biometric Registration conducted by IOM in Bor (December 2018) and UN House POC sites (October 2018), and the headcounts conducted in Wau Adjacent Area (April 2019), Bentiu (March 2019) and DRC headcount for Malakal (October 2018). The change in numbers (e.g. Bor POC, UN House POC 1 and POC 3) from the previous weeks reflects deactivation exercises undertaken in the context of joint WFP-IOM collaboration, whereby beneficiary households who do not show up for three consecutive food distributions are marked as no longer present/eligible for assistance. As such, the significant reduction in numbers does not reflect a recent outflow from the POC sites, but rather people who moved away a considerable time ago. Deactivations will henceforth continue a monthly basis for any beneficiary household that has not shown up for three consecutive food distribution rounds. Whereas increase in numbers may be a result of IDPs presenting themselves during a general food registration but may reside outside the POC sites. Nevertheless, Wau POC AA has experienced a recent influx of IDP arrivals.
